

Chapter - 1

Introduction

Government H. S. S. College, Magura, the traditional and best educational institution of Magura district under Khulna division. The college was established as non-government in 1940. It was later made Govt. college in 1979. Initially, higher secondary and undergraduate (pass) class were allowed, but now the college has introduced 14 Honors subjects and Masters Part-I and Part-II in 13 subjects. There are 11324 students at present; among them 7186 students (Male: 3382, Female: 3804) are in honors class, 821 students (Male: 358, Female: 463) are in Masters Class and 1661 students (Male: 582, Female: 1079) are in degree pass course. Beside this, 1656 students (Male: 1077, Female: 579) are taking education in HSC class.





Chapter - 2

2.1: Brief History of the College

Govt. Huseyn Shaheed Suhrawardy College, Magura is a tertiary level educational institution located in an enchanted environment surrounded by greenery on 8.70 acres of land. The college is situated at the center of Magura town, just opposite of Magura Municipality office, a few hundred yards north of Vaina Moar, the junction of Magura, Jashore and Jhenaidah road.

It was first established as the Islamic Intermediate College (I. I. College) in 1940 by the efforts of many enthusiastic people of Magura and its environs. Its first academic activities officially started on 17 September, 1940 at Magura Abdul Gani Madrasa. Maulvi Mo khlesur Rahman, a competent superintendent of the







madrasa, took charge as the principal. The inaugural prayer "munajat" was performed by Hazrat Maulana Abu Bakkar Siddiqui, the Pir of Furfura Sharif. Thus, began the journey of the 4th oldest college in South-West Bengal.

Through various evolutions and developments since the establishment of the college, Government Huseyn Shaheed Suhrawardy College, Magura is now under the direct control of the Directorate of Secondary and Higher Education, under the Ministry of Education, Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh. It is now an "A" category government educational institute which performs various courses such as higher secondary, Degree (Pass), Honours and masters course of various subjects.

In 1947, the Chief Minister of undivided Bengal, Huseyn Shaheed Suhrawardy, came to Magura with Randa Prasad Saha. Randa Prasad Saha announced the donation of Rs 5,000 in cash and ten tonnes of coal in a large public meeting at the college grounds and at the same meeting he proposed to name of the college after Chief Minister Huseyn Shaheed Suhrawardy. His proposal was accepted with the spontaneous support of the people present and the college was renamed as Huseyn Shaheed Suhrawardy College.

In 1952, the Islamic Intermediate college (I. I. College) was transformed into a general intermediate college. Then in 1956, B. A. class was opened. In 1962, I. Sc. and I. com and in 1964, B. Com classes were opened. Later in 1970, B. Sc course was opened and it became a full-fledged degree college. Subsequently, Honors courses were introduced in 5 subjects in 1998 and 9 subjects in two phases from the 2006-2007 academic year, a total of 14 Honors courses. In 2012, Masters final course in 9 subjects was introduced. At present more than 14000 students are studying in the college as regular, irregular and private students. At present, there are two modern computer labs where teachers and students are constantly receiving training on ICT.

The total land area of the college is 8.70 acres. There are 56 posts for first class BCS (Education) Cadre officers and 21 posts for 2nd, 3rd and 4th class staffs. Besides, due to the huge increase in the activities of the college, currently 48 irregular employees are employed.




Image Showing at A Glance College Layout Diagram

The college was established on an intact area of 8.70 acre which is surrounded by a complete boundary wall. The college has an open space of 2.63 acres, a pond of 1.80 acres, a playground of 2.40 acres with two gardens of 0.35 acres, buildings of 0.95 acres, road of 0.45 acres, Shahid Minar of 0.12 acres. There are 5 academic buildings (1 five storied, 2 four storied, 1 three storied and 1 two storied) in this institution. Besides, one administrative building (5 storied), two student hostels, two common rooms (one female, one male) are also available in this institution.


